





Cancer Nursing

Cancer nurses care for critically or chronically unwell patients with cancer. They work in a multidisciplinary team and in a variety of settings, from an inpatient ward, to the bone marrow transplant unit, through to the community setting. Cancer nurses will often see the patient early in their diagnosis and follow them through to cure or palliation. They are a specialised and highly compassionate nurse who has advanced skill in patient assessment, patient education and communication. They administer chemotherapy and monitor the patient's progress while providing supportive care. Cancer nursing can be a very rewarding career choice with many pathways, from Clinical Nurse Specialist to the Nurse Practitioner, with many opportunities for further study available in order to achieve career advancement.
